The Collect of the Day

Almighty God, the fountain of all wisdom, you know our necessities before we ask and our ignorance in asking: Have compassion on our weakness, and mercifully give us those things which for our unworthiness we dare not, and for our blindness we cannot ask; through the worthiness of your Son Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever, Amen.

The First Lesson: Jeremiah 12:1-6

Note: This prophet preached near the time of the fall of Jerusalem to Babylon (587 BC). He is critical of the royal leadership who have neither attended to God or the people. In the promise of God to provide a righteous shepherd he provides us an image of faithfulness channeled into the care of his people.

Woe to the shepherds who destroy and scatter the sheep of my pasture! says the LORD. Therefore thus says the LORD, the God of Israel, concerning the shepherds who shepherd my people: It is you who have scattered my flock, and have driven them away, and you have not attended to them. So I will attend to you for your evil doings, says the LORD. Then I myself will gather the remnant of my flock out of all the lands where I have driven them, and I will bring them back to their fold, and they shall be fruitful and multiply. I will raise up shepherds over them who will shepherd them, and they shall not fear any longer, or be dismayed, nor shall any be missing, says the Lord.

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will raise up for David a righteous Branch, and he shall reign as king and deal wisely, and shall execute justice and righteousness in the land. In his days Judah will be saved and Israel will live in safety. And this is the name by which he will be called: "The LORD is our righteousness."

The Psalm 23

The Epistle: Ephesians 2:11-22

Note: Continuing this letter we are reminded that we are no longer strangers to God but part of the new family of God.

Remember that at one time you Gentiles by birth, called "the uncircumcision" by those who are called "the circumcision" —a physical circumcision made in the flesh by human hands- remember that you were at that time without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us. He has abolished the law with its commandments and ordinances, that he might create in himself one new humanity in place of the two, thus making peace, and might reconcile both groups to God in one body through the cross, thus putting to death that hostility through it. So he came and proclaimed peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near; for through him both of us have access in one Spirit to the Father. So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone. In him the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom you also are built together spiritually into a dwelling place for God.

The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. He said to them, "Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while." For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of them. As he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things.

When they had crossed over, they came to land at Gennesaret and moored the boat. When they got out of the boat, people at once recognized him, and rushed about that whole region and began to bring the sick on mats to wherever they heard he was. And wherever he went, into villages or cities or farms, they laid the sick in the marketplaces, and begged him that they might touch even the fringe of his cloak; and all who touched it were healed.

The Fruits of Compassion

The needs of the world seem overwhelming. Indeed, even our own needs, the needs in our immediate world, can feel just as overwhelming. We sometimes have a hard time looking beyond ourselves.

Think of an emergency room doctor on a particularly busy night with patients coming and going. The doctor has her own personal issues to struggle with, exhaustion perhaps being the chief culprit.

Jesus says, come away from all of this and find rest and restoration. But, as in this Sunday's gospel lesson, the patients keep coming and not only coming but actively seeking out. There is a desperation in the world for healing.

Jesus takes a moment to look out and around him. He sees the need: "they were like sheep without a shepherd". He has compassion upon them. The word implies a gut level feeling for these desperate people. We could call it empathy.

Empathy moves the focus from ourselves to another. More than that it describes a kind of communion with another, where we have a deep awareness of their pain as we stand next to it without condescension. Empathy, therefore, at its best is a form of love

Love is the resting place Jesus offers us. We rest in his love in our own pain. Others rest in our love as we rest in his and in this shared compassion there is a mutuality of healing. We are healed as we participate in the healing of others.

We therefore do not worry about resources. We bring what we have to those who come to us and allow the love of God to do the heavy lifting. We can only be the shepherd to others to the extent that we rest in the Good Shepherd and discover in him our calling and our peace.


