### The First Lesson: Proverbs 9:1-6

Note: This is a book of good advice. Don't hang out with those who are going to bring you down, it says. On the other hand, seek the best always, seek wisdom. The wisdom of God is symbolized as a women with fine things to eat and drink. Dine here, she says. Come as you are, come simply and cast away all affectation and you will be nourished.

Wisdom has built her house.

she has hewn her seven pillars.

She has slaughtered her animals, she has mixed her wine,

she has also set her table.

She has sent out her servant-girls, she calls

from the highest places in the town,

"You that are simple, turn in here!"

To those without sense she says,

Note: The letter at this point seems to converge on the same theme of living the good life. It also brings the great key to that life: rejoice! Joy and thanksgiving lifts our hearts and frees us from self-absorptions and idolatry.

Note: This portion of the psalm sounds a lot like proverbs, offering good advice. But it

also asks an important question: do you really want to live the good life? If you do,

but those who seek the LORD lack nothing that is good.

Be careful then how you live, not as unwise people but as wise, making the most of the time, because the days are evil. So do not be foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is. Do not get drunk with wine, for that is debauchery; but be filled with the Spirit, as you sing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs among yourselves, singing and making melody to the Lord in your hearts, giving thanks to God the Father at all times and for everything in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

#### The Holy Gospel: John 6:35, 41-51

Note: This is the next to the last installment of Jesus' commentary on the feeding of the 5,000, the "bread of life discourse". John's gospel is the latest of the four, written late in the 1st c. So we see in Jesus' word the understanding and experience of the early church regarding the Holy Eucharist as they then experienced it.

Jesus said, "I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats of this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give

for the life of the world is my flesh."

The Jews then disputed among themselves, saying, "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" So Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you have no life in you. Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood have eternal life, and I will raise them up on the last day; for my flesh is true food and my blood is true drink. Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them. Just as the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever eats me will live because of me. This is the bread that came down from heaven, not like that which your ancestors ate, and they died. But the one who eats this bread will live forever."

#### Take this Body, this Blood

The question about the meaning of the Holy Eucharist appears to have come very early, as early as the gospel of John: "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" It is a horrible idea if we are talking about a mere human being. But the early church understood Christ Jesus as more than that, as the manifestation of the living and loving God. To "eat his flesh" meant above all to participate in the life of God.

And for 900 years there wasn't much controversy. Writers, such as St. Augustine, would describe the Holy Eucharist sometimes in literal and sometimes in figurative language. It was something you did, not something you talked about.

Until the ninth century. Two monks of the same French monastery wrote two different views. One emphasized a "realistic", literal view and the other a more figurative, mystical view. Nothing indicates this interrupted their monastic brotherhood.

But the theological snowball started, pilling up into the avalanche of the 16<sup>th</sup> c. Reformation. Protestants claimed Catholics were too literal and, worse, engaging in idolatry. Catholics doubled down and excommunicated those who saw the Eucharist as a "mere memorial", bereft of the actual presence of God. It was more complicated than this, but it lays out the spectrum of battling belief.

Richard Hooker, the great 16<sup>th</sup> century Anglican theologian, had a characteristically sensible take on the controversy: "I wish that men would more give themselves to meditate with silence what we have by the sacrament, and less dispute of the manner how."

What is happening in the Holy Eucharist? God is happening. What is happening to us in the Holy Eucharist? God is happening. We come to the Holy Eucharist, in Liturgy of Word and Holy Communion, so that we might become a place where God is happening and carry that happening into the world.
